With the message: 'You Don't Need Superpowers to Protect your Business' police are reaching out to firms across the county to drive down business crime. The aim is to showcase the free services available and encourage businesses to work with the force to protect themselves and their staff against crime.

The Superpowers campaign was launched this week at a networking event hosted by the FSB. Chief Inspector Richard Butterworth, force lead for business crime, said: "This campaign is all about empowering businesses and making sure that they know what support is available.We are determined to ensure that businesses feel safe and supported

"Whether you're a shop keeper, landlord, butcher or engineer, we are here to protect you, to protect livelihoods and in turn protect the region's economy. Through some free and simple steps, we can help keep South Yorkshire open for business and closed to criminals."

From shoplifting and metal theft, arson and burglary, to fraud and assault, business crime is defined as any criminal offence committed against a person or property that has a connection to a business. It currently accounts for around 17 per cent of all recorded crime in South Yorkshire with shoplifting making up 66 per cent of that figure. Chief Insp Butterworth added: "One of our biggest assets is our team of specialist advisors who will visit you and carry out a free security survey. They will look at all the ways you can reduce the chances of being a victim of crime from security fencing, property marking and lighting to protection of data. Businesses can also access a free 'bizkit' on our website that features information about a variety of subjects including cyber security, lone working, cash on premises and social media.

Gordon Millward, Regional Chairman of the FSB said: "Criminal activity is one of the major barriers to growth within the small business community.

"Whether it manifests in the simplest form of shoplifting or the more sophisticated computer fraud and data theft, business crime has a direct impact on the bottom line of the business, causing job losses and economic stagnation.

"It is vital that small businesses work in partnership with the police and local authorities to stamp out business crime and secure jobs and prosperity for present and future generations."

Be aware that motor insurance conditions often state that your insurance is conditional on your vehicle being secured when left unattended. In some instances your insurance may be invalid if the vehicle is stolen or property stolen from it and it had been left insecure.

1,600 new jobs to be created at Humber Enterprise Park

The pioneering 79-acre Humber Enterprise Park in Brough, East Yorkshire, has been launched by LC Industrial, the strategic partnership between Lumina Real Estate Capital (LREC) and Leeds-based business space specialist Citivale,

The park includes circa 1 million sq ft of high-quality office and industrial space, 20 acres of development land and benefits from Enterprise Zone and Assisted

Area Status which offers significant incentives to attract new occupiers. The park was launched at a special opening ceremony attended by councillors and officers from East Riding of Yorkshire Council, property agents and representatives from the media.

So far £2.5 million has been spent on regenerating the whole site, described as "a jewel in the Humber's crown" with another £4.5 million earmarked for further improvements. It is estimated that 1,600 new and sustainable jobs will be created when the park is fully developed during the next five years. The Enterprise Park was acquired from BAE Systems in a multi-million pound transaction.

Paul Bell, head of Economic Development for the East Riding of Yorkshire Council, who attended the launch, said: "This is an exceptionally exciting development, which will provide a tremendous boost to the area's economy with the creation of sustainable jobs. The care, commitment and attention to detail shown by the developers is exemplary and we look forward to watching the successful regeneration of this site over the coming years."

Forty-two per cent in Yorkshire say they'd prefer to be self employed

New research from the NatWest shows that the appetite to become self-employed and set new businesses is greater than ever– but it is fear of failure that is holding the majority back.

The latest edition of the NatWest Entrepreneurship Monitor – a quarterly survey of people across the UK – shows that 33 per cent of all residents in Yorkshire think now is a good time to set up in business, the highest proportion since the poll was launched three years ago.

Dale Sidebottom, Entrepreneur Development Manager at NatWest, said: "Despite improving economic conditions and a widely held desire to be self employed, only a very small number of people are

actually taking the plunge. These findings show we have a region full of potential entrepreneurs, but they are held back by a lack of knowledge. NatWest wants to fill that gap and, in partnership with Entrepreneurial Spark and KPMG, will be launching free business accelerator hubs across the UK over the coming years."

Survey reveals manufacturing output has fallen

The Confederation of British Industry SME Trends Survey 2015 has revealed that manufacturing output growth has fallen among small and medium-sized firms at the fastest rate since January 2013.

The number of domestic orders has decreased and export orders have fallen at the fastest rate since 2009. Rain Newton-Smith, CBI Director of Economics, said: "Manufacturers expect conditions to stabilise somewhat over the quarter ahead, but remain concerned about the outlook for demand."

Industry warns of slow-lane if Spending Review cuts support



Britain risks entering the industrial slowlane if support for innovation and hi-tech research is slashed in the forthcoming Spending Review, manufacturers have warned.

Publishing its submission, the manufacturing organisation EEF points to an increasing fragile outlook for the sector. It says this means that the important job of balancing the books must not be allowed to derail industry's long-term prospects by creating uncertainty or adding to the cost

burden for globally-exposed manufacturers.

In particular, EEF is cautioning against any reduction in the support Government provides to back some of the UK's most advanced industries. To do so would send out the wrong message to companies that are responsible for more than two thirds of the UK's research and development activity and almost half of exports.

Consultation on business rates appeals system

The Department for Communities and Local Government has launched a consultation on proposals to improve the appeals system for business rates. A straightforward three-stage appeals process has been proposed, and the consultation is open until 4 January 2016.

Marcus Jones, Minister for Local Government, said: "The business rates appeals process has been in a decades-long deadlock, hampered by some unscrupulous agents making speculative appeals - sometimes for businesses unaware this is being done on their behalf."

Small firms dissatisfied with legal profession

Small firms' dissatisfaction with legal services providers has remained unchanged over the last two years, research published by the Legal Services Board has indicated.

In 2013, Legal Services Board research revealed that just 13% of small firms believe lawyers are cost effective, and a survey of 10,528 small firms earlier this year produced the same result. Many of the firms recently questioned said they went to an accountant rather than a lawyer for legal help, and around one in two described lawyers as "a last resort".

Successful food hygiene prosecutions published

The Food Standards Agency has published details of all the successful food hygiene and food safety prosecutions in England, Wales and Northern Ireland.

The information published includes details of the food business establishments that have been prosecuted, the nature of the offences and the sentence that was enforced. Since April 2015, there have been 419 prosecutions, 25% of which relate to cleaning offences. Further breaches include proprietors keeping unfit food on premises, a lack of hand washing facilities and inadequate pest control measures.

Rod Ainsworth, Director of Legal Strategy at the Food Standards Agency, said: "We want businesses to understand how important it is not to flout the rules which are there to protect public health. If they do, then both we and local authorities will take action against them."

High compliance with tobacco display regulations



The Chartered Trading Standards Institute has issued a report which reveals that 89% of convenience stores, 83% of off licences, 92% of newsagents and 97% of petrol stations are fully compliant with the recently introduced .

The ban was introduced in an attempt to prevent children from taking up smoking and requires all tobacco retailers to remove tobacco products from displays in their stores. Retailers who breach the Tobacco Advertising and Display Regulations 2010 are liable to

an unlimited fine or six months in prison. Examples of non-compliance included display doors being left open and ill-fitting blinds covering displays.

Increase in self-assessment and PAYE tax shortfall

The difference between the amount of self-assessment and PAYE tax due for the tax year and the amount actually collected by HM Revenue and Customs reached \pounds 8.5 billion in 2013/14.

This is an increase of almost 10% on the corresponding figure for 2012/13. The selfassessment tax gap increased by 5% from 2012/13 to 2013/14 to reach £4.6 billion, and the PAYE shortfall rose by 15% to £3.9 billion during the same period. Law firm Pinsent Masons expects HMRC to continue to focus on investigating individual taxpayers, and also highlights figures which indicate that investigations into employment tax underpayment have reached a record high.

European Parliament plans corporate tax reform

The European Parliament's special committee on tax rulings has voted to adopt its recommendations for making corporate taxes in the EU fairer and more transparent.

MEPs intend to push ahead with ambitious plans to promote comprehensive EU tax reform and the committee's measures are intended to prevent multinationals from moving profits to low tax jurisdictions within the EU.

This will be achieved through the use of tax rulings, so that loopholes and contradictions within the EU's 28 national tax laws are closed. MEPs are basing their recommendations on the principle that multinational companies should pay their taxes where they make their profits.

Apart from the loss of public income, it is considered unfair that big companies pay very little tax on their profits, while small and medium-sized firms have to pay their full share.

New proposals to protect tied pub tenants

The Department for Business has launched a consultation on proposals that are part of a new Pubs Code to ensure that large pub owning firms deal fairly with their tied tenants. This will ensure that tied tenants are treated similarly to free-of-tie tenants. It is a requirement of the Small Business, Enterprise and Employment Act that the Pubs Code is in place by the end of May 2016.

Anna Soubry, Minister for Small Business, Industry and Enterprise said: "Pubs are the lifeblood of so many of our towns, villages and high streets, playing a vital role supporting our local economies. It's not right that some tied pub tenants are unfairly overcharged by their landlords and the Pubs Code will help ensure they get a fair deal."
